161st Anniversary of Miller Arrival Topic of November Program

The Charlevoix County History Preservation Society, in collaboration with the Boyne District Library, is pleased to present another installment in our 2017 History Speaker Series Programming. "The Millers: Boyne's First Permanent Settlers" will take place on Saturday, November 11th, 2017 at 1:00 PM in the Boyne District Library's Lower Level Community Room, 201 East Main Street in Boyne City, Michigan.


It will be 161 years ago this coming November 14th, 2017, when a man and his wife beached a fishing boat on the shores of north Boyne. After walking up the hill they found a dilapidated shelter - their dream cabin - which they immediately claimed as their home. And thus began a residency that marked the beginning of the history of Boyne. These hardy pioneers were John and Harriet Miller and why they came to Boyne is one of the most remarkable stories in Charlevoix County history.

Shortly after settling in their home, John Miller and his two sons, James and Hugh, explored the swampy shoreline on Pine Lake [now Lake Charlevoix]. Soon they came upon a scenic stream that reminded John of the one he had lived near in Ireland. He promptly christened it the Boyne River. And so, because of these two pioneers, a determined woman who wanted to find the cabin in her dream and a gentle but nostalgic man, that the community of Boyne was founded and named.

Please plan on joining us on November 11th, 2017 and take an amazing journey through time to celebrate the 161st Anniversary of the arrival of Boyne City's first settler's, as only historian Bob Morgridge can deliver. His program, complimented by an amazing array of early photographs, will outline how Boyne City came to be, 161 years ago!




Boyne City's 1917 LaFrance Fire Engine Framed Photograph and Stamp

We Are Very Saddened To Report...

We were very disappointed to learn, only days prior to the event, that the CCHPS would not be allowed to participate in the Boyne City Fire Station and Museum "Sneak Peak" event held during the Antique Car Show on August 10th and 11th at the new Boyne City City Hall. Apparently the Historic Commission felt that our organization and products would be a conflict of interest with their newly decided upon venue. While we fully respect their decision, we regret that we were not given ample notice, or the opportunity to discuss options with them that could have made this a "win-win" situation for us all. We remain hopeful that the new Museum Board of Directors will be more interested in collaborating with the CCHPS, as we do (and have always done) with all of the other historic groups, museums and organizations throughout Charlevoix County.

This was also extremely disappointing news as we had planned our product line around this year's focus on the 100th anniversary of the LaFrance Fire Engine and the restoration of the Boyne City clock tower. Our expenditures too were based on having our group represented at this event. Since Bob Morgridge and the CCHPS newest book, Boyne City's Old Town Clock Tolls Again, was scheduled to arrive from the printer earlier that same day, tying Bob's book signing in with the "sneak peak" at the newly installed clock mechanism seemed logical to us - but apparently not to the powers that be. We regret that we can offer our membership no further details, but to date, we have yet to receive any response to our inquiries as to why the decision to eliminate our CCHPS booth was made, or why we received no official notice that we were not to attend.

Projects in the Works...





37th Annual Picnic of the Old Settler's Association of Grand Traverse County

R.C. Leavenworth, Boyne City



Many years ago, a large, panorama photograph was brought to the attention of the CCHPS by one of our members. While there was no date on the image, it was easy to place its having been taken around the turn of the last century. The "clue" lay in the notation by the photographer that this represented the 37th Annual gathering of this group. Where was the event held? Photographer Russell C. Leavenworth's studio was located in Boyne City, MI, but did that location concur with where the group was photographed?

Confirmation of this was finally found in articles printed in both the <u>Charlevoix County Herald</u> (East Jordan, MI) and the <u>Charlevoix Sentinel</u> newspapers in June 1918. While the latter article served as a sort of "save the date" announcement, the following comes from the East Jordan publication:

The Charlevoix County Herald Friday, June 21, 1918 Page 5 Column 1

The 37th annual meeting and picnic of the Old Settler's Association of Grand Traverse Region will be held at Charlevoix, next Wednesday, June 29th. A big time is anticipated.

~ Thus, another mystery solved!



NEWS FLASH! MAJOR ACQUISITION TO THE CCHPS ARCHIVE
