Perhaps the highlight was picking blackberries, grinding flour and working together to make biscuits, butter and whipped cream for shortcake. What a feast, when everyone works together to make it happen!

Discovery campers are almost camouflaged in front of the Triceratops panel. Campers took time out from Pioneer living to check out the two new dinosaur stations along the Connections Trail.

Dinosaurs now populate two stations along the **Connections Trail**. T-rex and his fellow dinosaurs are actually visible from the main building, thanks to careful positioning by The Wood Shop, who framed and installed the fanciful paintings done by artist Kelly Boyle. All the dinosaurs are about half their actual size. Visitors will soon be able to compare their height to the dinosaurs in inches at T-rex station and in cubits at the Triceratops station which is further along the **Trail**.

The Garden Loom became the third new station installed along the Connections Trail this week! The Loom will soon be ready for visitors to pick weeds and weave them through the warp threads! It will be fun to see a participatory weaving take shape!
