Re: Youth Innovation in Rural America

In the fall of 2022, Michigan Humanities chose Raven Hill to host a Smithsonian **Museum on Main Street** (MoMS) traveling exhibit called *Spark! Places of Innovation* highlighting innovation in rural communities. The exhibit will be on display at Raven Hill from August 26 to October 7 of 2023.

In conjunction with the *Spark!* exhibit, the Center was also selected to participate in a Smithsonian project called **Youth Innovation in Rural America (YIRA)**. Raven Hill is working with **MoMS** and the **Cooper Hewitt Smithsonian Design Museum** on this project and is one of only two sites chosen out of four states (Idaho, Illinois, Kentucky and Michigan) to partner with the Smithsonian on this project.

Raven Hill hosted the Smithsonian team for a preworkshop dinner. Thanks, Café Sante, for a warm welcome to the area, after a rather harrowing drive from Traverse City in whiteout conditions!

The **goal** of **YIRA** is to encourage local youth to identify a challenge that their community faces and then work to find an innovative solution to that challenge. This weekend at Raven Hill Discovery Center, nine teachers from Char-Em ISD, representing Boyne City, East Jordan, Ellsworth, Harbor Springs and Petoskey, participated in a two-day professional development workshop with the **Cooper-Hewitt Smithsonian Design** team. Teachers got hands-on, minds-on practice on how to use the design process to guide student innovation in their communities.

After the training, teachers will be asked to implement the design process in their classroom or with a group of students. The student innovation projects will take place between February and May 2023.

Participating students will learn about collaboration, critical thinking, problem solving, empathy, communication, teamwork and many other innovation design skills. They will engage in meaningful conversations with the community, draw from the local culture and work to identify opportunities for positive change. Then, students will identify a specific community issue or challenge; use design process strategies to create a solution and document their work for presentation to the public on Saturday, May 6, 2023 at a celebratory program. The student displays will remain on display at Raven Hill Discovery Center through the end of *Spark!*

Participating teachers will guide students during the innovation design process; support students during their projects and help students detail their innovative solution with a display.



The challenge for all participants: draw two circles and incorporate them into an illustration of a "non-motorized" vehicle. Of course, there were all manner bicycles and skateboards, but Kim from Cooper Hewitt "drew" on her experiences here at the Center and came up with the idea of riding two snowballs down Raven Hill. What "non-motorized" vehicle would you draw?!
