The progression of thought from Bonnie's Button House at Raven Hill to a single button from her collection mirrors a journey from the grand to the intimate, from the collective to the personal, and from the tangible to the symbolic. It begins with an appreciation for the sheer scale and whimsy of the Button House, an entire structure adorned with countless buttons, each one contributing to the overall tapestry of color, texture, and history. Created by volunteers Nancy Hellman, Gayle Levengood and Georganna Monk, the sight of Bonnie's Button House is overwhelming and a celebration of abundance and creativity.

As visitors step closer, curiosity shifts from the whole to the parts. They start noticing patterns, buttons grouped by color, size and material. Thoughts begin to narrow, shifting from the whole



Button House to the individual stories of the buttons within it. Who wore these buttons? Where did they come from? How were they made and of what material? How did they all end up here, side by side, in this unique display of human craftsmanship?



Bonnie's Button House was created in honor of Bonnie Culver, reminding me about the boxes and boxes of buttons yet to be displayed and from there to Bonnie's treasured BIG BOOK OF BUTTONS by Elizabeth Hughes and Marian Lester. It was her "button bible." From there, a single button stands out isolated and fastened to a cardboard backing with notes written in pencil. This small, often overlooked button now becomes a window into a different time, place, and person. The thought progression becomes reflective. That single button is more than just a fastener. It illustrates craftsmanship, utility and history, including the economics of its era.





These advertising buttons of filled bakelite were made for distribution to car dealers and service stations as a promotional giveaway in 1937. What's a recent promotional giveaway that you have gotten--refrigerator magnet, pen, key chain, coffee mug, t-shirt, hat, carabiner?

This particular button above is an old filled Bakelite button. Bakelite is an early form of plastic that was manufactured using a specific technique involving fillers. Bakelite, invented by Leo Baekeland in 1907, was the first fully synthetic plastic and became widely used in various applications, including buttons. Filled Bakelite Buttons refers to Bakelite resin that has been combined with fillers such as wood flour (finely ground wood particles—think sawdust, cotton fibers, clay or other minerals, and even asbestos in some older versions. These fillers were added to enhance durability, reduce costs and achieve specific textures or colors.

In the end, the journey from Bonnie's Button House to a single advertising Bakelite button is a reminder that within every collection, no matter how vast, there is always a story waiting to be discovered, a connection waiting to be made, and a deeper understanding of the relationship between the objects kept and lives lived. At Raven Hill Discovery Center, this journey of discovery is at the heart of our mission: to provide a place that enhances hands-on and lifelong learning for all ages that connects science, history, and art. as visitors are encouraged to uncover the connections that shape our world and transform our lives.
