Labyrinth Builders Club

Labyrinth Builders will place their donated rocks to form an intricate and permanent pathway, leading to and from a meditative focal point at the center of the labyrinth.

Participants will become members of the **Labyrinth Builders Club** and will be invited to join in a celebration of the finished labyrinth at a date yet to be determined.

The concept of the labyrinth originates in ancient Greek mythology. According to myth, the legendary Labyrinth was on the island of Crete. The master craftsman Daedalus designed it to imprison the Minotaur, a half-man, half-bull creature. This famous mythological labyrinth is considered the first labyrinth, influencing mazes and labyrinths in cultures around the world and throughout history.

Labyrinths are traditionally made from locally available materials—stone, earth, mosaic or living plant hedges. The new labyrinth at the Ancient World will be constructed of local stones left behind 10,000 years ago by the glaciers that once covered Michigan and will naturally extend the current indoor exhibit, **Under Michigan & Beyond**. The Greek-style labyrinth will enhance Raven Hill's Ancient World area, once again blurring the boundaries between science, history and art for visitors.
