

Eddy currents



Seeing and feeling eddy currents is easy with a piece of copper pipe and a small magnet that fits inside. A non-magnet falls thru quickly, but the small magnet is slowed down by the eddy currents and takes a lot longer to fall thru the pipe!

The **HOT Project** empowers teachers with flexible learning options, excites students through hands-on exploration, and strengthens Raven Hill's mission to build lifelong connections linking science, history, and the arts. Wednesday, Raven Hill spent the day in Harbor Springs Middle School, getting 7th graders excited about adaptation, while 6th graders explored circulation as part of their study of human body systems. Friday, East Jordan kindergarten students visited Raven Hill to explore the hands-on Discovery Room, learn about snakes, lizards and turtles in the Animal Room and discover the old-fashioned Schoolhouse, Treehouse, Music Garden, Jurassic Park and Ancient World outdoors. Whether Raven Hill comes to schools or classrooms come here, it's truly each teacher's choice, while providing unique learning experiences for students.
